WILDCATS READY TO BATTLE MAINE FOR THE BRICE-COWELL MUSKET, THE CAA NORTH DIVISION TITLE AND A SPOT IN THE NCAA PLAYOFFS:

Every new game seems to be bigger than the last, but no contest this season has bigger implications than this one, as UNH and Maine battle for the Brice Cowell Musket (awarded annually to the winner of the contest), the CAA North title, as both teams are 5-2 and tied for first, and an opportunity to possibly secure a spot in the NCAA FCS playoffs with a win this week. Fans can expect a very physical, hard-fought game between these two New England rivals. Maine is riding a six-game winning streak and UNH has won four of its last five contests. Both teams have celebrated victories over Massachusetts in recent weeks, which set the table for this decisive, end of the regular season, matchup. Both defenses are strong. UNH is now ranked second in the nation in turnover margin and Maine's defense is allowing its opponents just 317.7 yards per game and has compiled 23 sacks this season. UNH's offense compiled 620 yards against a stout UMass defense last week which creates an interesting matchup. Maine runs a ball-control offense that has averaged 202.6 rushing yards per game and will look to kill the clock. UNH has had a good mix on offense with 170.4 rushing yards per game and 253.5 passing yards per game for 423.9 yards overall.

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SCOUTING MAINE: The Black Bears have won six straight games to put themselves in the hunt to make the 2008 NCAA FCS Playoffs with impressive wins over Delaware, Hofstra, Northeastern, Iona, Massachusetts and Rhode Island. The losses this season for Maine have come against some tough opponents in the form of the University of Iowa and highly-ranked CAA teams Richmond and James Madison. Many different players carry the football for the Black Bears, but the squad has been led this season by Jhamal Fluellen with an average of 50.6 yards per game and one TD and by Jared Turcotte, who leads the team in rushing touchdowns with five and he has 53 carries for 404 yards and an average of 44.9 yards per game. At quarterback, the starter is Michael Brusko, who has been very efficient with the football, has completed 66.7 percent of his passes and has thrown five TDs. He has also rushed 54 times for 245 yards and two TDs. Defensively, Maine is very talented in all areas, but perhaps their best player has been Jovan Belcher, who leads the team in total tackles (34-50-84), leads the squad in sacks with 6.5 this season and he leads the team in tackles for a loss as well with 13.0 for a loss of 55 yards. Maine's defense has also been outstanding at causing turnovers with a total of 17 interceptions this season and seven fumble recoveries. The Black Bears are mentored by 16th-year head coach Jack Cosgrove. Maine's defense has been stout this season, holding five teams under 13 points or less, including one shutout vs. Northeastern.

THE ALL-TIME SERIES VS. MAINE AND THE HISTORY BEHIND

THE BRICE-COWELL MUSKET: The series between these two longtime New England rivals now stands at 46-43-8 in favor of the Wildcats, who have won the last five meetings between these two CAA schools. Last year, UNH won by a 39-14 margin in Durham. Two seasons ago, UNH won in OT to propel the Wildcats into the NCAA playoffs with a 19-13 win in Orono. Maine has not won in Durham since the 2001 campaign when the Black Bears posted an impressive 57-24 victory. The all-time series began back in 1903 and Maine won that initial meeting in New Hampshire, 10-0, and went on to win eight straight for the longest winning streak of the series. The Brice-Cowell Musket is a special award that is given to the winning team in this New England rivalry game each season. The award is named after two former coaches, Fred Brice of Maine and William Cowell of UNH. The tradition began in the late 1940s. The musket is a flintlock rifle made by Ebenezer Nutting of Falmouth, Maine between 1722 and 1745. The George I period flintlock has a 43 inch barrel and is rifled to a .65 caliber.

SENIOR LINEBACKER MATT PARENT NAMED SPORTS NETWORK NATIONAL AND CAA DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK FOR OUTSTANDING EFFORTS IN WIN OVER UMASS:

Senior linebacker Matt Parent (Long Beach, Calif.) was named the Sports Network National Defensive Player of the Week and the Colonial Athletic Association's Defensive Player of the Week for his outstanding efforts in the University of New Hampshire's 52-21 victory over New England rival Massachusetts on Nov. 15. The winner of the Bill Knight Trophy, awarded annually to the MVP of the UNH/UMass football game, tied a league-record for the longest-ever interception return when he picked off a Liam Coen pass and took it back 100 yards for a score. The pick-six, which was the first in league play since JMU's Tony LeZotte took an interception back 100 yards against Towson in 2005, put the Wildcats on top 10-0 midway through the first quarter. With 2:50 left in the first quarter, junior defensive lineman T.J. Taylor knocked a ball loose and Parent picked it up for a fumble recovery and five-yard return. One play later, New Hampshire extended its lead to 24-0 with a 48-yard touchdown run. Parent, who came up with another fumble recovery in the fourth quarter, ended his day with six total tackles including one for a loss of four yards.

REDSHIRT FRESHMAN TIGHT END CHRIS JEANNOT NAMED CAA ROOKIE OF THE WEEK AFTER SCORING TWO TDs IN WIN

VS. UMASS: University of New Hampshire redshirt freshman tight end Chris Jeannot (Moon Township, Pa.) was named the Colonial Athletic Association's Rookie of the Week for his two touchdown catches in the Wildcats' 52-21 victory over Massachusetts on Nov. 15. Jeannot's TD catches accounted for 92 of

the Wildcats' 295 receiving yards. The 6-6, 230-pounder logged a 77-yard touchdown catch in the closing minutes of the first half -- the first TD-catch of his career. He then caught a 15-yard touchdown toss from sophomore quarterback R.J. Toman with 7:46 left to play in the game. Prior to the contest against UMass, Jeannot had caught just two passes for 10 yards playing in a back-up role to junior All-America tight end Scott Sicko.

WILDCATS RANKED SECOND IN THE NATION IN TURN-OVER MARGIN AND TIED FOR THIRD IN THE NATION IN INTERCEPTIONS MADE: One of the keys to the success of the UNH defense this season according to Coach McDonnell is creating turnovers. The UNH defense has been getting the job done and is presently ranked second in all of FCS with a mark of 1.70 this season. UNH is tied for third in the nation in interceptions made with 19 and tied for 15th in the nation for fumbles recovered with 12.

UNH BREAKS 46-YEAR OLD CAA RECORD FOR INTERCEPTION RETURN YARDAGE IN A GAME VS. HOFSTRA: The UNH defense broke a 46-year league record with 207 INT-return yards against Hofstra on Nov. 1. The old mark was set by Maine against Bowdoin on Nov. 10, 1962. The Black Bears had 160 yards in interception returns. UNH had five interceptions in the contest vs. The Pride.

SENIOR WIDE RECEIVER MIKE BOYLE SECOND IN CAA IN RECEPTION YARDS AND THIRD IN CATCHES: One player opponent defenses can not afford to ignore is senior wide receiver Mike Boyle (Plymouth, N.H.). Boyle continues to make big catches for the 'Cats. In fact he is ranked third in the CAA in catches made (5.3) and he is second in the conference in receiving yards with a mark of 87.1 ypg. Boyle leads all receivers in touchdown catches with eight in 2008.

UNH FOOTBALL ROAD WARRIORS ONCE AGAIN IN 2008: The UNH football team has once again proven to be road warriors in 2008. After 10 games played, five of them on the road, the Wildcats are 4-1 when playing out of a suitcase. The Wildcats have defeated Army (28-10), Rhode Island (51-43), Dartmouth (42-6) and Northeastern (33-21) in games played away from Cowell Stadium. The lone loss was a 24-13 loss at Villanova.

JUNIOR TIGHT END SCOTT SICKO WELL ON HIS WAY TO ANOTHER ALL-AMERICAN SEASON: Junior tight end Scott Sicko (Stillwater, N.Y.) has been living up to the preseason All-America hype. After nine games played, Sicko already has seven touchdown catches, good for second on the team. In all, Sicko has accumulated 39 receptions for 469 yards and is well on his way to his best season ever as a Wildcat. Last year, which was also an All-American season for him, Sicko recorded 51 catches for 619 yards and six touchdowns. He has already topped last year's touchdown total with two regular season games to play.

TOM BISHOP HAS BEEN IMPRESSIVE UNH'S PUNTER AND PLACEKICKER AND EVEN KICKOFFS: Senior punter/placekicker Tom Bishop (Newfield, N.Y.) is making a strong bid for CAA All-Conference honors. So far this season he is averaging 42.0 yards per punt after booting the ball 29 times for 1,218 yards with 15 punts inside the 20. He has also booted a long of 56 yards this season. As a placekicker, he has taken over the job as the starter and has posted impressive numbers, hitting 6 of 9 field goals, including a career-best of 46 yards against UMass. He is also a perfect 27-27 in extra points this season. He has also been handling kickoffs since the Villanova game after Tom Manning pulled a hamstring.

UNH FOOTBALL POSTS 500TH ALL-TIME VICTORY ON OCT. 25 AGAINST TOWSON: The UNH football program celebrated a major milestone when it defeated Towson on Oct. 25. The 42-14 victory over the Tigers was the 500th win in the history of the UNH football program. Interestingly, UNH head coach Sean McDonnell was part of an amazing 142 of the first 500 victories, as a player, assistant coach and head coach.

DINO VASSO NAMED CO-CAA DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK FOR EFFORTS IN WIN OVER HOFSTRA: Sophomore corner Dino Vasso (Crum Lynne, Pa.) was named the Co-CAA Defensive Player of the Week for his outstanding defensive efforts in UNH's victory over Hofstra on Nov. 1 (45-25). Vasso led the Wildcats on the day with 12 total tackles, including one for a loss of seven yards and forced a fumble. The sophomore hauled in two of New Hampshire's five interceptions of the contest and returned his fourth-quarter pick 66 yards for a touchdown, making the score 45-17. The Wildcat defense forced seven Pride turnovers on the day, including interceptions by Vasso (2, 1 TD), John Clements (1, 1 TD), Hugo Souza (1) and Ryan Hinds (1). The defense also recovered two fumbles. UNH returned three interceptions for touchdowns in the victories over Towson and Hofstra.

RYAN HINDS NAMED SPORTS NETWORK NATIONAL DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK, CAA PLAYER OF THE WEEK, AND ECAC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK AFTER WIN OVER TOWSON: Junior defensive back **Ryan Hinds** (Toronto, Ont.)

was named The Sports Network National Defensive Player of the Week, the Colonial Athletic Association's Defensive Player Of the Week, and the ECAC Defensive Player Of The Week for his outstanding efforts in UNH's 42-14 CAA victory over Towson on Oct. 25 at Cowell Stadium. The win was the 500th in the history of the football program. Hinds put the Wildcats on the scoreboard at 10:23 of the first quarter when he stepped in front of a Sean Schaefer pass and returned it 74 yards for a touchdown. The last time UNH had returned an interception to the house was in 2005 when Corey Graham returned his interception 73 yards at Towson. In the second quarter, Hinds again intercepted a Schaefer pass inside of New Hampshire territory and returned it 35 yards, setting up a 7 yard touchdown pass from sophomore R.J. Toman (Mission Viejo, Calif.) to junior running back Sean Jellison (Amherst, N.H.). Hinds ended the day with a total of 109 yards in interception returns, the second-best single-game total in league standings this season. The defensive back also recorded six tackles in the contest, including four solo stops.

WR TERRANCE FOX MADE THE MOST OF BACK-TO-BACK STARTS VS. NORTHEASTERN AND TOWSON Sophomore wide receiver Terrance Fox (Piscataway, N.J.) made the most of his first career start in the win vs. Northeastern on Oct. 18 (33-21). Fox went in for the injured Matt O'Brien and posted career highs of 8 catches for 103 yards. He also ran back a 49 yard kick return then made a 31 yard touchdown catch to spark

27 unanswered points for the Wildcats, who trailed 21-6 at half. Fox also made three key catches in UNH's final touchdown drive of the contest to help ice the win. He did it again in his second start vs. Towson (Oct. 25), grabbing four catches for another 103 yards in the win. He also had another TD catch, a 40-yarder from Toman. In addition, he returned a kick 45 yards.

QB R.J. TOMAN RESPONSIBLE FOR 29 TDS THIS SEASON:

Sophomore QB R.J. Toman (Mission Viejo, Calif.) has thrown 25 touchdown passes so far this season and also rushed for four more, making him responsible for a total of 29 TDs this season. He is completing 68.7 percent of his passes this season (193-281) and is averaging 248.3 passing yards per game this season. He has thrown only seven interceptions as compared to his 25 passing TDs and he is ranked among the nation's leaders in the following categories:

TACKLES LIST: Senior tri-captain Matt Parent (Long Beach, Calif.) continues to move up UNH's all time tackles list after a very productive four seasons at linebacker for the Wildcats. He is presently second on the 2008 squad in tackles with 25-48-73. He recorded 88 total tackles in 2005, 90 in 2006, and 81 in 2007 to give him 326 total tackles in his career. That places him fourth on UNH's all-time tackle list.

JUNIOR RUNNING BACK CHAD KACKERT STARTED OUT STRONG BEFORE INJURIES

10TH YEAR HEAD COACH SEAN McDONNELL POSTS 68th CAREER WIN:

10th-year head coach **Sean McDonnell** now owns a 68-48-0 record as the head coach at the University of

New Hampshire. He was named the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year in 2005 as selected by "The Sports Network". In the last five seasons, McDonnell and his team has posted an impressive overall mark of 45-15 and the program is 27-12 vs. CAA opponents during that timespan. McDonnell was named the Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year in 2004 and was named District I Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) after leading UNH to its best season ever in the history of the program. The Wildcats also finished first in the North Division of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference and won their first-ever NCAA I-AA tournament game with a victory at Georgia Southern. McDonnell led his squad to the NCAA I-AA Quarterfinals three straight times 2004-2006 and made a fourth straight appearance in the NCAA championships in 2007, dropping a first-round game to No. 1 seeded Northern Iowa.

R.J. TOMAN EARNS BOSTON GLOBE GOLD HELMET AWARD FOR EFFORTS AT URI: University of New Hampshire sophomore quarterback R.J. Toman (Mission Viejo, Calif.) was named the recipient of this week's Boston Globe Gold Helmet Award, which is presented on a weekly basis to the top college football player in the area at the New England Football Writers Luncheon on the campus of Harvard University. Toman had his best game as the starter last week, leading his team to a high-scoring 51-43 victory at CAA rival Rhode Island on Sept. 13. Toman threw a career-high five touchdown passes in the contest, good for a career-high mark, just one touchdown shy of the all-time record for touchdown passes in a game set by former Walter Payton Award winning quarterback Ricky Santos. Toman also completed 29 of 40 passes for 309 yards (all career-bests). He connected on touchdown passes of 8, 20, 4, 39 and 20 yards in the contest. Toman presently ranks 14th in all of FCS with a pass efficiency mark of 159.73 and he is ranked 12th in the nation in total offense with an average of 236.0 yards per game.

HUGO SOUZA AND JOHN CLEMENTS EARN CAA WEEKLY HONORS FOR EFFORTS IN VICTORY OVER ARMY: Sophomore Hugo Souza (Marshfield, Mass.) and senior John Clements (Hammonton, N.J.) of the University of New Hampshire football team were both honored today by the Colonial Athletic Association for their outstanding play in the Wildcats' 28-10 upset victory at Army on Sept. 6. Souza grabbed CAA Football Defensive Player of the Week honors after helping New Hampshire knock off its fourth FBS foe in five seasons. The Marshfield, Mass., native led the Wildcats with 10 total tackles, eight of which were solo stops. Souza also made two stops behind the line of scrimmage, including a sack for five yards. With just under a minute remaining in the third quarter, Souza picked up a loose ball and returned it 22 yards for a touchdown extending the New Hampshire lead to a decisive mark of 28-10. The honor is the first for Souza playing under the CAA Football banner. Clements, the CAA Football Special Teams Player of the Week, also played a major part in New Hampshire's 28-10 win on the road over FBS foe Army. Clements helped get the Wildcats on the board with just over two minutes remaining in the first quarter. The Hammonton, N.J., native returned a kickoff 87 yards for a touchdown, knotting up the score at 7-7 after Army took the early lead. The return was Clements' first for a touchdown and the longest return of his UNH career. The CAA Football weekly honor is also a first for Clements. Souza was later named ECAC Player of the Week and Any Given Saturday National Player of the Week for his efforts.

GIANT SLAYER UNH MAKES IT FOUR WINS IN A ROW OVER FBS FOOTBALL TEAMS FOLLOWING ITS VICTORY AT ARMY, 28-10: The UNH football team continued its success vs. FBS teams this year as the Wildcats upset FBS opponent Army at West Point, 28-10.. Last season UNH posted a 48-35 victory over Marshall. UNH also posted two other impressive FBS victories with a 34-17 win over Big Ten Northwestern in 2006 and a victory over Big East Rutgers in 2004 (35-24).

WILDCATS LOOKING FOR FIFTH CONSECUTIVE APPEARANCE IN THE FCS NCAA TOURNAMENT.: UNH has made four straight appearances in the FCS NCAA tournament and is looking to make its fifth straight appearance in 2008. UNH advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals three straight times from 2004-2006. Last year the Wildcats lost in the first round vs. No. 1 seeded Northern Iowa after a last minute touchdown by the Panthers that earned them the 38-35 victory.

TE SCOTT SICKO AND PUNTER TOM BISHOP NAMED FIRST-TEAM PRESEASON ALL-CONFERENCE BY THE COLONIAL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION; UNH PICKED SECOND IN THE NORTH DIVISION: For the second consecutive year, the University of New Hampshire football team has been selected to finish second in the North Division of the Colonial Athletic Association by the league coaches and media in the CAA poll released Wed., July 23 at the conference Media Day. The Wildcats were ranked second behind Massachusetts, which has won the conference championship the past two years, and is predicted to be the overall champion in 2008. UMass received a conference-best 17 first-place votes as the favorite to win the CAA title. Ranked among the top 25 in five national preseason polls so far this year, UNH continues to sustain a reputation as a top

team in the conference and nation. The Wildcats have made it to the NCAAs four consecutive times, and advanced to the quarterfinals three out of the four. Two veteran players, junior tight end Scott Sicko and senior punter Tom Bishop, were also named to the 2008 CAA Football Preseason All-Conference Team. Sicko had an All-American season at tight end, ranking second on the team in receptions with 51, and third in both receiving yards (619) and touchdowns (6). Bishop was named second team all-conference for his performance during the 2007 season. He finished the year with 44 punts for 1,776 yards and an impressive average of 40.4 yards per boot. UNH FOOTBALL RANKED 16TH IN THE NATION IN FCS ACCORDING TO THE PRESEASON SPORTS NETWORK POLL:

The University of New Hampshire was ranked No. 16 in the nation in a preseason poll released by The Sports Network this week. UNH has been ranked in the top 25 since the start of the 2004 season for the longest stretch of any program in the Colonial Athletic Association. In addition, the CAA placed a total of six teams in the 2008 Sports Network Preseason Football Championship Subdivision Poll, as four squads were ranked among the Top-10. Richmond, one of two defending CAA Football champions, leads the way at No. 4. Massachusetts, picked to win the 2008 CAA Football Championship and defend its 2007 league title, comes in at No. 5. James Madison earned three of the 101 total first-place votes and will begin the season ranked No. 6 in the Sports Network Top-25. Delaware, which last year became the fourth CAA Football team in five years to play in the National Championship game, earned a No. 9 ranking in the preseason poll. Outside of the poll's Top-10, but also among CAA Football's six ranked squads were UNH at No. 16, after making four consecutive appearances in the NCAA tournament, and Villanova at No. 21. Both Hofstra and Maine appeared in the preseason poll release, but fell just outside the Top-25. The Pride notched 61 votes, while the Black Bears were one of two teams to log one vote. CAA Football's six ranked squads mark the first time since 2005 the league has had as many ranked in a preseason poll. The last time CAA Football placed six among the Top-25 was in Week 11 of the 2007 season which included Delaware, Hofstra, James Madison, Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Richmond.

UNH FOOTBALL NAMES TRI-CAPTAINS FOR 2008: Three UNH seniors were named tri-captains for the 2008 football season. Senior wide receiver **Mike Boyle** (Plymouth, N.H.) returns as an outstanding receiver and return specialist. Senior offensive lineman **Eric Cumba** (Paterson, N.J.) enters his third season as a starter for UNH. And senior linebacker **Matt Parent** (Long Beach Calif.) starting his fourth season, brings key leadership to a young defensive squad.

UNH DEFENSE POSTS IMPRESSIVE STATS IN VICTORY OVER ARMY INCLUDING FOUR TURNOVERS AND THREE SACKS:

The UNH defense did much of what it was asked to do in the victory over Army. The defensive line held against the run stopping the fullback dive, the defense came up with four turnovers in the form of four fumble recoveries. UNH also put pressure on the quarterback with three sacks and several hurries. While the defense had no interceptions, it had three pass breakups vs. a team that did not throw often. Finally, the defense had seven tackles for a loss of 29 yards which was also impressive.

QB R.J. TOMAN HONORED LAST YEAR (CAA ROOKIE OF THE WEEK) IN FIRST MAJOR APPEARANCE AFTER POSTING WIN OVER DELAWARE, OCT. 6:

Redshirt freshman quarterback R.J. Toman didn't miss a beat as he led UNH to an impressive 35-30 win over No. 11 Delaware on Oct. 6, 2007. Toman, stepping in for Walter Payton Award winner Ricky Santos who left the game with a shoulder injury, completed 5-of-9 passes for 98 yards and two touchdowns en route to his winning his first-ever CAA Rookie of the Week honor. After Santos left the game in the second quarter Toman continued what was already a 57-yard drive and turned it into a 77-yard scoring drive. The redshirt freshman completed a 21-yard pass to Delaware's one-yard line on the seventh play of the drive, which allowed the Wildcats to plunge into the endzone for a 14-3 lead. The Mission Viejo, Calif., native later completed touchdown passes of 28 and 36 yards to Keith LeVan, and finished the game with seven rushes for 47 yards -- just four yards shy of Santos' team-high 51 yards on eight carries in the game.

SCOTT SICKO NAMED A PRESEASON ALL-AMERICAN BY

THE SPORTS NETWORK AND THE COLLEGE SPORTING

NEWS UNH has had a strong tradition of bringing in talented tight ends and sophomore **Scott Sicko** (Stillwater, N.Y.) is no exception.. The junior was named a preseason All-American this season. Sicko enjoyed a breakout sophomore campaign for the Wildcats in 2007, recording 51 catches for 619 yards and six touchdowns. He finished second on the squad in catches behind only graduated senior wide receiver Keith LeVan, who recorded 71 receptions, and Sicko was third in receiving yardage. The tight end was named an All-American for his efforts in 2007 by The Sports Network. Sicko was also named to the Colonial Athletic Association Preseason All-Conference squad for the 2008 season. DE BRIAN McNALLY OF CORNWALL, N.Y. MAKES HIS FIRST APPEARANCE AT UNH AS A STARTER NEAR HIS HOMETOWN:

Redshirt freshman defensive lineman Brian McNally (Cornwall, N.Y.) has been impressive since he arrived at UNH and he will be getting his first start at defensive end right near home at West Point. McNally played at Cornwall High School where he helped his squad to an 11-2 record as the Section 9 champions and the New York State runner-up. He was also named second-team All-State as a defensive end and was a three-time letterwinner on the Cornwall basketball team.

SENIOR JOHN CLEMENTS A KEY LEADER IN THE DEFENSIVE BACKFIELD:

Senior defensive back John Clements (Hammon-ton, N.J.) has been a steady performer in UNH's defensive backfield over the past three seasons and this year he will be looked upon to provide leadership and help pick up where graduated senior Jeff Pammer left off. Clements, a second-team All-Conference pick last year and an ECAC All-Star, was third on the team in tackles as a corner last season (54-45-99) and started all 12 contests for the 'Cats. He also had an interception vs. Dartmouth and drew all of the toughest defensive assignments in terms of covering top receivers. He is expected to once again be a strong candidate for post-season honors as well for UNH.

WILDCATS RETURN FIVE OF TOP SIX RECEIVERS FROM 2007:

Sophomore quarterback R.J. Toman (Mission Viejo, Calif.) has plenty of experienced targets to throw to this season as five of the top six receivers return with experience and plenty of catches to their credit. Here's a look at what he has returning to the receiving corps. in 2008. UNH did lose one outstanding senior to graduation in Keith LeVan.

UNH boasts an impressive stable of running backs returning for the 2008 season, including the top two from 2007. Junior Chad Kackert (Simi Valley, Calif.) led the group with 80 carries for 380 yard and four rushing TDs, while senior Robert Simpson (Brockton, Mass.) added 64 carries for 284 yards and three TDs. Throw in powerful runner Sean Jellison (Amherst, Mass.) and UNH has a talented group to carry the football in 2008. Here's a look at what they did in 2007.

CHAD KACKERT ALSO RETURNS AS TEAM'S TOP KICK RE-TURNER WITH IMPRESSIVE AVERAGE OF 26.3 YARDS:

Junior Chad Kackert (Simi Valley, Calif.) also is back as UNH's top kick return specialist from last season with an average of 26.3 yards on 20 returns for 526 yards. He also scored one touchdown and notched a long return of 94 yards. Throw in senior Mike Boyle (Plymouth, N.H.) as a kick returner and UNH's top punt returner and the Wildcat special teams are in a position to earn some decent field position. Boyle returned 12 kicks for 246 yards and returned eight punts for 50 yards on a team that did not punt very often in 2007.

NEW FACES ON THE UNH COACHING STAFF:

The University of New Hampshire football team has brought in two new assistant coaches who have joined the staff for the upcoming 2008 season. Mike Ferzoco is working with the outside linebackers and former UNH offensive lineman Brian Barbato is responsible for coaching the tight ends. Barbato, who comes to UNH after serving as the outside linebackers and safeties coach under former UNH assistant coach Chris Phelps at St. Lawrence University, spent two seasons as a staff member with the Saints' football squad. He gained valuable experience with the program, serving as assistant recruiting coordinator, assistant video coordinator, assistant academic coordinator and as assistant strength and conditioning coach. In 2004, Barbato mentored the UNH offensive line, working as the assistant offensive line coach. The Wildcats finished 10-3 that season, advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals and had one of the top offenses in the nation in several key statistical categories. Barbato also gained football coaching experience at Exeter High School in 2005, where he was part of a team that posted a 10-2 season record and placed second in the running for the Division II New Hampshire state championship title. A 2004 graduate of UNH, Barbato was an outstanding offensive lineman for the Wildcats, earning second-team All-Atlantic 10 honors in 2003 and third-team honors in 2002 as a 37-game starter who played all five lineman positions. Ferzoco comes to UNH via Kenyon College where he worked as an assistant coach since the 2004 season. He most recently served as the offensive coordinator and coached the quarterbacks and receivers during the 2006 and 2007 seasons. In 2007 his offense broke the school record for yardage with 460.2 yards per game and averaged 31.2 yards per contest. His offense was also explosive in 2006, as the squad averaged 451.4 yards per game and posted 35.4 ppg., 12th-best in the nation. He also served as coach of the offensive line in

2005 and was the wide receivers coach in 2004. Ferzoco is a 2004 graduate of Kenyon, where he earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in Political Science.

COACHES MEDIA TELECONFERENCE CALL: The CAA Football coaches will hold a weekly media teleconference every Monday of the football season. The scheduled calls will come to an end when the final CAA Football squad loses in the 2008 NCAA Division I National Championships. Coaches will only participate in the postseason calls if their teams are still alive in Championship play. The teleconference will open at 10 a.m. with the release of the four selected player of the week winners, a recap of the weekend and a preview of the following week. CAA Football coaches will be available to answer questions beginning at 10:10 a.m. as the weekly lineup is listed below. Beginning Sept. 1 and continuing throughout the 2008 season, a featured student-athlete will conclude the call with a 10-minute interview segment at 12:10 p.m.

UNH FOOTBALL COACH'S SHOW RETURNS ON MONDAY NIGHTS IN 2008: On Monday, September 8th WTSN (AM-1270) will kick off another season of the Monday Night UNH Football Show. The show, which will air throughout the football season on Monday nights from 6:30 P.M. to 7:30 P.M. will feature head coach Sean McDonnell and the players. Each week Coach McDonnell will discuss the previous Saturday's game and preview the upcoming game with host, Andy Schachat. Each week Schachat will also interview one of the players. WTSN (AM-1270) is now streaming online at wtsnam1270.com, allowing UNH football fans all over the world, a chance to listen to the show.

UNH FOOTBALL ON THE RADIO: The UNH athletic department has formed the "UNH Sports Network" which began in 1999 to provide radio coverage of UNH athletics. Veteran play-by-play announcer Jim Jeannotte who has been broadcasting Wildcat athletics since 1973, will continue to anchor the show. Handling the color analysis will be Mike Murphy and sideline reporting will be performed by Andy Schachat. All 11 Wildcat contests will be broadcast live, with a pre-game show airing 30 minutes prior to kickoff. The flagship station of the network is WTSN, 1270 AM in Dover, which is the originating station. Games will also be heard on WNTK 99.7 FM, WUVR 1490 AM, WGIR 610 AM and WCNL 1010 AM. All UNH football home games are also broadcast on WUNH 91.3 FM, the campus student station.

GAME STORIES FROM THE 2008 SEASON:

A LOOK AT THE 28-10 UNH UPSET VICTORY AT ARMY (SEPT. 6): WEST POINT, N.Y.— UNH rushed for two TDs, scored on a fumble return and had a kickoff return for a TD as the Wildcats posted a 28-10 victory over Army at Michie Stadium on Saturday afternoon. It marked UNH's fourth consecutive victory over an FBS school in five years. The Wildcats also defeated Rutgers in 2004 (35-24), Northwestern in 2006 (34-17) and last year defeated Marshall (48-35). The Black Knights, who fell to 0-2 on the season, opened the scoring at 2:35 of the first quarter on a 2-yard pass play to Mike Evans from quarterback Carson Williams to make it 7-0 after the PAT. The touchdown was setup by a 56-yard pass play to Jameson Carter from Williams. The drive was six plays for 77 yards (3:19). However, on the ensuing kickoff, senior John Clements (Hammonton, N.J.) returned the football 87 yards with 2:19 to play in the first quarter. The extra point was good by senior Tom Bishop (Newfield, N.Y.) and the game was quickly tied at seven apiece. It was the first kick return for a touchdown for Clements and also the longest of his career. Last season Clements returned four kicks for 94 yards including his previous best of 57 yards. Army fumbled the football at 11:55 of the second and it was recovered by sophomore defensive lineman Lance Mailloux (Bedford, N.H.). The offense took over on UNH's 26 yard line with 11:35 to go in the first half. UNH then drove down the field and scored on a 23-yard run by junior running back Chad Kackert (Simi Valley, Calif.) and the Wildcats took a 14-7 lead on an eight-play, 79 yard drive (3:00). Army fumbled again at 5:56 of the second quarter providing a fumble recovery for Clements after a forced fumble by sophomore linebacker Hugo Souza (Marshfield, Mass.) on

the UNH 20 yard line, but Army recovered a UNH fumble and took over 1st and 10 on the UNH 47 yd line on a wet and drizzly afternoon. Army closed the gap with 25 seconds remaining before the half when Matt Campbell booted a 42 yard field goal to close to within four points to make it 14-10 as UNH took a knee and went to its lockerroom with the lead. UNH opened the third quarter with a well-engineered, nine-play, 66-yard drive, capped off by a five yard run by senior wide receiver Mike Boyle (Plymouth, N.H.) at 11:19 to give UNH the 21-10 lead following the PAT Bishop. The drive, which mixed the run and the pass, used up 3:34 off the clock and gave UNH the lead it would not relinquish. The UNH defense put the exclamation point on the day by getting into the scoring with 50 seconds remaining in the third quarter when Souza picked up a fumble forced by sophomore defensive lineman Steve Young (Rochester, N.H.) and ran it 22 yards into the endzone. The PAT by Bishop was good and the Wildcats held an 18-point advantage for the rest of the game after more impressive defensive play and an effective running game sparked by junior running back Sean Jellison (Amherst, N.H.) who carried the football 10 times for 87 yards late in the game. Statistically, UNH outgained the home team by a 322-264 total yardage margin and even outgained Army's option offense running game, 184 yards to 169. The Black Knights were held to just 83 total yards in the second half by a stout UNH defense. Sophomore quarterback R.J. Toman handled the offense well in wet humid conditions completing 12 of 17 passes for 138 yards in a game dominated by rushing. In addition to Jellison's work late in the ballgame, Kackert rushed 12 times for 68 yards. Boyle led all receivers with four catches for 57 yards. Defensively, Souza and Clements led all tacklers with 10 each. Souza also finished the day with one sack, two tackles for a loss a forced fumble and a fumble recovery.

UNH IMPROVES TO 2-0 WITH CAA WIN AT RHODE ISLAND:

KINGSTON, R.I.— Sophomore quarterback R.J. Toman (Mission Viejo, Calif.) threw five TD passes and junior running back Chad Kackert (Simi Valley, Calif.) ran for a career-best 164 yards to lead the 10th-ranked University of New Hampshire football team to a 51-43 victory at the University of Rhode Island on Saturday afternoon. Toman completed 29 of 40 passes for a career-best 309 yards and Kackert finished with 310 all-purpose yards and one 72 yard rushing touchdown. UNH (2-0 overall, 1-0 CAA) took the lead early in the contest after both teams stalled in their opening drives. Junior Tom Manning (Rome, N.Y.) booted his first field goal of the season, a 37-yarder with 5:54 to play in the first quarter put the Wildcats up 3-0. Junior tight end Scott Sicko (Stillwater, N.Y.) made three tremendous catches during one drive, including an 8 yard touchdown catch from Toman at 14:52 of the second quarter to increase UNH's lead to 10-0. The UNH defense did not give up a first down until the 14:00 mark of the second quarter. Junior defensive lineman Kevin Peters (Pleasantville, N.J.) sacked URI quarterback Derek Cassidy and caused a fumble that was recovered by sophomore defensive lineman Steve Young (Rochester, N.H.) on the URI 28 yard line. Then with 10:54 on the clock Toman completed a 21 yard touchdown pass to the endzone for junior wide receiver Travis Negron (San Diego, Calif.). The PAT was good and UNH led by a 17-0 margin. URI (1-2 overall, 0-1 CAA) got on the board at 7:59 of the second quarter on a 1 yard drive by Anthony Ferrer. Following the PAT the Rams cut the lead to 10 points 17-7. Rhode Island then made it 17-10 at 5:32 of the second quarter following an interception. The field goal, a 36-yarder was kicked

by Louis Feinstein. However, UNH responded quickly with a short pass by Toman to sophomore running back Sean Jellison (Amherst, N.H.) who ran 4 yards into the endzone untouched. After the PAT, the Wildcats led 24-10 with just 2:42 left before the half. Sophomore cornerback Dino Vasso (Crum Lynne, Pa.) made a big interception with five seconds left on the UNH 2 yard line to prevent a possible URI touchdown. UNH opened the second half with a long kickoff return by Kackert that took the football down to the URI 39 yard line. Then, Toman completed his fourth TD pass of the contest to a wide open senior wide receiver Mike Boyle (Plymouth, N.H.) After the PAT UNH led by a 31-10 margin with 14:40 to go in the third quarter. However, Rhode Island scored just as quickly on an 83 yard pass, catch and a long run by running back Jimmy Hughes After the PAT the UNH lead was cut to 31-17. The Wildcats scored again on a 26 yard field goal by Manning at with 10:57 in the third to increase the UNH advantage to 34-17. Rhode Island's Cassidy capped a long Rhode Island drive with an eight yard touchdown run with 4:55 remaining in the third quarter and UNH's advantage shrank to 34-24 and the Rams were back in the contest. UNH fumbled the football on their own 28 yard line with 4:38 left in the third quarter giving the Rams a chance to make it closer. They did on a 1 yard TD pass by Cassidy to Ferrer and after a missed PAT by Feinstein left UNH up by just four, 34-30. Kackert gave UNH more breathing room at 2:26 running through a big hole on the left side and breaking 72 yards to open up a 41-30 lead with 2:26 to play in the third after the PAT. Following a failed fake punt attempt by URI that left the football on the URI 40 yard line, UNH took advantage and scored on a 20 yard touchdown pass from Toman (his fifth of the game) to Boyle at 13:26 of the fourth quarter to make it 48-30 UNH Feinstein put three more points on the board for URI with a 32 yard field goal at 10:09 of the fourth to cut the UNH lead to 48-33. UNH took the ball down to the URI 2 yard line and Manning was forced to kick a 19 yard field goal with 6:21 to play and the Wildcats led 51-33, a lead they would not relinquish. In addition to Toman and Kackert, Boyle made nine catches for 132 yards and two touchdowns to lead all UNH receivers. Leading the defense in tackles was Vasso with nine tackles (7 solo) to go with his interception.

UNH SURGES PAST ALBANY, 32-24: DURHAM, N.H. – R.J. Toman (Mission Viejo, Calif.), the reigning Boston Globe Gold Helmet Award winner, passed for 255 yards and four touchdowns to lead the 10th-ranked University of New Hampshire football team to Saturday afternoon's 32-24 non-conference victory against the University at Albany at Cowell Stadium. UNH is now 3-0 and has opened the season with three consecutive wins for the third time in the last four years, and the Wildcats have won four straight home openers. Albany, which has played a CAA opponent in all three games this season, is 1-2. New Hampshire's receiving corps was led by Mike Boyle (Plymouth, N.H.; seven receptions, 79 yards, one TD) and Scott Sicko (Stillwater, N.Y.; five catches, 104 yards, two TDs). Chad Kackert (Simi Valley, Calif.) carried the ball 16 times for 106 yards and also had four receptions for 53 yards. Albany was led offensively by Vinny Esposito, who completed 21 of 31 attempts for 283 yards and one TD, and David McCarty with 130 rushing yards on 39 carries. Trailing 17-7 late in the second quarter, UNH scored 16 points in 4 minutes, 18 seconds to take a 23-17 lead. On a drive that started on their own 32 with 46 seconds remaining in the first half, the Wildcats pulled within 17-14 on a 19-yard pass play from Toman to Kackert in which Kackert absorbed a hit near

the goal line and stayed in-bounds at the right pylon. Tom Manning (Rome, N.Y.) added the point-after-touchdown with three seconds on the clock. New Hampshire's defense forced Albany to a three-and-out to start the third quarter, and an errant long snap on the punt play gave the 'Cats possession on the Great Danes' 24 yardline. On the ensuing play, Toman lofted a pass to the back-left corner of the end zone to Sicko and another Manning PAT gave UNH its second lead of the game, 21-17, at 13:04. Another errant long snap by Albany sailed over the head of punter Chris Lynch, who scooped up the ball at the Albany 20 yardline and flipped the ball out of the end zone for a safety and a 23-17 Wildcats' lead at 10:45. The Great Danes regained momentum, however, by forcing a punt and then marching 77 yards on seven plays to take a 24-23 lead at 6:16 on a 19-yard pass play from Esposito to Chris Kenneally. UNH went back in front, 29-24, at 3:37 of the third quarter on a 7-play, 60-yard drive that culminated with a 24-yard pass from Toman that Boyle, alone in the middle of the end zone, corralled with his fingertips. The Wildcats' two-point pass attempt failed. Manning's 45-yard field goal extended the advantage to 32-24 four seconds into the fourth quarter. With the 'Cats marching in Albany territory early in the fourth quarter, Dave Casale intercepted Toman's pass at the 12 yardline and returned it to the 21. A 42-yard pass play from Esposito to Tim Bush advanced the ball to the UNH 24, then a Wildcats' penalty gave the Great Danes 1st-and-goal at the UNH 7. Three McCarty runs moved the ball to the 6, then on fourth down Esposito's pass to Kenneally fell incomplete and the visitors lost the ball on downs with 8:05 remaining. After gaining three first downs, UNH was forced to punt. Ross Bertrand blocked the punt attempt and teammate Duane Harper recovered the ball at the UNH 32. Facing 4th-and-2, Esposito attempted a quick pass to the right side, but a blitzing Hugo Souza (Marshfield, Mass.) leaped into the air and batted the ball directly into the ground to stop the Great Danes with 2:08 to play. Kackert and Robert Simpson (Brockton, Mass.) alternated carries and Simpson's seven-yard gain on 3rd-and-7 advanced the ball to the Albany 30 and secured the win, as the visitors had just one timeout remaining with 1:15 on the clock. UNH took a 7-0 lead at 13:39 of the first quarter when Toman found Sicko alone behind the secondary for a 65-yard play. Albany scored 17 consecutive points to take a 17-7 lead. They pulled within 7-3 on Herb Glass' 47-yard field goal at 11:40, then went ahead 10-7 on McCarty's 19-yard run as he went untouched up the right side. On a quarterback sneak on 3rd-and-2 at the UNH 11, Esposito broke through the line for the touchdown to give the Great Danes a 17-7 lead at 10:40 of the second quarter. UNH's defensive effort was led by Sean Ware (Bristol, Conn.) and Dino Vasso (Crum Lynne, Pa.) with 13 and 12 tackles, respectively.

UNH WINS GRANITE BOWL TROPHY WITH 42-6 VICTORY AT DARTMOUTH: HANOVER, N.H.— Sophomore running back Sean Jellison (Amherst, N.H.) ran for a pair of touchdowns in the first quarter to lead the University of New Hampshire to a 42-6 Granite Bowl victory at Dartmouth College on Saturday at Memorial Field. The No.7 Wildcats remain undefeated with a 4-0 record, while the Big Green falls to 0-2 overall. Jellison gave the Wildcats an early 7-0 lead at 8:28 of the first quarter with a 4 yard touchdown run that capped off a six-play, 50 yard drive. The PAT was kicked by junior kicker Tom Manning (Rome, N.Y.). Jellison struck again with 49 seconds remaining in the first quarter when he broke two Dartmouth tackles, spun left and ran 16 yards for the touchdown. After the PAT the Wildcats held

a 14-0 advantage. The defense got its first turnover of the contest midway through the second quarter when junior Terrence Klein (Westwood, N.J.) intercepted an Alex Jenny pass and gave UNH the ball on the Wildcat's 37 yard line. As a direct result of the interception, junior wide receiver Travis Negron (San Diego, Calif.) ran in UNH's third touchdown of the afternoon from the 6 yard line and after the PAT by Manning the Wildcats held a 21-0 lead at 6:41 of the second quarter. The Wildcats got their fourth straight rushing touchdown of the first half on a 4 yard run by sophomore quarterback R.J. Toman (Mission Viejo, Calif.). The Manning PAT went through the uprights once again and UNH held a commanding 28-0 lead. Dartmouth made one last attempt to score at the end of the first half, but an interception by redshirt freshman free safety Ryan McGuinness (Howell, N.J.) gave UNH the ball at its own 22 yard line. However, UNH was unable to get close enough for a field goal before the intermission. The UNH defense, which held the Big Green scoreless in the first half, gave up just 92 yards of offense in the first half, while the 'Cats moved the ball 310 yards, 132 on the ground and 178 yards in the air. UNH opened up a 35-0 lead at 6:40 of the third quarter on an 18 yard pass play from Toman to sophomore wide receiver Terrance Fox (Piscataway, N.J.). It was the first passing touchdown of the afternoon for the 'Cats. Manning improved to 5-5 in PATS on the afternoon. Dartmouth got on the board with 24 seconds remaining in the third quarter on a 1 yard TD pass from Jenny to Philip McKeating. The PAT was no good and the score was 35-6 in favor of the visitors. Senior running back Robert Simpson (Brockton, Mass.) completed the UNH scoring with a 5 yard TD run with 8:23 remaining in the contest to give the Wildcats a 42-6 lead. Simpson led all rushers in the game with 82 yards on 14 carries, while Jellison finished with 8 carries for 64 yards. Toman was the top passer for UNH, completing 17 of 23 passes for 208 yards and one touchdown. UNH utilized eight different receivers and was led by senior Matt O'Brien (Cambridge, Mass.) with 5 catches for 38 yards and by senior Mike Boyle (Plymouth, N.H.) with five catches for 32 yards. For the defense, UNH was led by McGuinness with his seven total tackles and by sophomore cornerback Dino Vasso (Crum Lynne, Pa.) with six.

UNH LOSES FIRST GAME OF THE SEASON VS. WILLIAM & MARY, 38-34: Jake Phillips' 17-yard touchdown pass to D.J. McAulay with 22 seconds remaining lifted the William & Mary football team to Saturday afternoon's 38-34 victory against fourth-ranked University of New Hampshire in front 13,255 Homecoming Day fans at UNH's Cowell Stadium. UNH fell to 4-1 overall and 1-1 in the CAA while the Tribe improved to 3-2, 1-1. Trailing 34-31, W&M began the game-winning drive at its 28 yard-line with 4:34 on the clock. On 3rd-and-11, a Hugo Souza (Marshfield, Mass.) interception was negated by a roughing the passer infraction against the Wildcats that gave the Tribe 1st-and-10 at the 42. The visitors converted two more 3rd-and-long situations to advance the ball to the UNH 36. Three plays later, on 1st and 10 from the 17, Phillips eluded the pass rush, stepped up to the line of scrimmage and lofted a pass complete to McAulay at the left pylon for the touchdown. Brian Pate's PAT made the score 38-34. UNH's Terrance Fox (Piscataway, N.J.) returned the ensuing kickoff 26 yards to the UNH 45. After an illegal substitution call against New Hampshire, Wildcats' quarterback R.J. Toman (Mission Viejo, Calif.) was sacked on first down, forcing a timeout with 11 seconds remaining and the ball on the 32. Toman rolled to the right and his pass down the sideline was intercepted by Fred Johnson at the W&M 30. Phil-

lips took a knee to elapse the last four seconds. Toman finished 27 of 36 for 305 yards, two touchdowns and two interceptions. He was UNH's leading rusher with 55 yards on 14 carries, and that included TD runs of two and three yards. Scott Sicko (Stillwater, N.Y.) caught nine passes for 81 yards, including a 31-yard TD, and Mike Boyle (Plymouth, N.H.) had 114 yards on seven catches with a 34-yard TD. Phillips engineered William & Mary's second-half comeback, as the Tribe outscored UNH 31-13 in the second half. After compiling just 137 first-half yards on 26 offensive plays, W&M amassed 358 second-half yards on 49 plays. Phillips finished 30 of 40 for 310 yards and four TDs. Jonathan Grimes, whose 56-yard touchdown run evened the score at 28 at 12:43 of the fourth quarter, ran for 144 yards on 23 rushes. He also had seven catches for 47 yards. W&M took a 7-0 lead at 6:17 of the first quarter on an 8-yard pass play from Phillips to Chase Hill, who ran a slant from the right slot. Toman's pair of rushing touchdowns – both around the right tackle – gave UNH a 14-7 lead. His two-yard run at 3:02 capped a 10-play, 60-yard drive. A John Clements (Hammononton, N.J.) interception immediately gave possession back to the Wildcats, and five plays later Toman ran the ball in with 57 seconds remaining in the opening stanza. On the second play of the second quarter, a Dino Vasso (Crum Lynne, Pa.) 47-yard interception return gave the 'Cats 1st-and-10 at the W&M 46. New Hampshire marched to the 1-yard line, but was turned away on fourth down on a Michael Alvarado interception in the end zone. UNH extended the lead to 21-7 at 4:36 of the second quarter when Boyle hauled in a lateral near the left sideline and ran it in the end zone from nine yards out. Despite a missed field goal of 28 yards on the first possession of the game, the 'Cats took that 14-point advantage into halftime. The Tribe scored on its initial two possessions of the third quarter to pull even, 21-21. The comeback began with a 14-play, 78-yard drive that consumed 5:54 and ended with a 14-yard pass play from Phillips to Hill at 9:00. UNH stalled at the W&M 27 on its ensuing drive and missed a 44-yard field goal attempt to keep the score 21-14. The visitors then marched 73 yards on 12 plays, the last of which was a 4-yard TD pass in the flat to Rob Varno with 28 seconds left in the third. New Hampshire responded with a seven-play, 59-yard drive that culminated at 13:33 with the 31-yard Toman-to-Sicko combination in which Sicko spun out of an arm tackle at the 20 and rumbled down the left sideline. Grimes' 56-yard scoring scamper – he hesitated at the line of scrimmage, cut back to the left and went untouched into the end zone – leveled the score. The Tribe then forced a three-and-out by the 'Cats and took a 31-28 lead at 6:20 on Pate's 32-yard field goal, which capped a 10-play, 65-yard drive. It took UNH just seven plays and 1:31 to cover 60 yards and regain the lead, 34-31, at 4:40. On 3rd-and-8 from the W&M 34, UNH's offensive line protected Toman from the blitz and that allowed him to connect with Boyle on a post route. The point-after-touchdown caromed off the left upright, leaving the 'Cats with the three-point cushion. William & Mary then went on its game-winning drive.

UNH SCORES 27 UNANSWERED POINTS IN THE SECOND HALF IN COME-FROM-BEHIND WIN AT NU, 33-21: BROOKLINE, MASS. – The University of New Hampshire football team came back from a 21-6 halftime deficit by scoring 27 unanswered points to defeat Northeastern University (33-21) at Parsons Field on Saturday afternoon. The Wildcats took their first lead of the contest, and the lead for good, when junior tight end Scott Sicko (Stillwater, N.Y.) caught a 16 yard pass from sophomore quarterback R.J. Toman (Mission Viejo, Calif.) to

make the score 26-21 with 13:47 remaining in the contest. The clincher came with 49 seconds remaining when senior running back Robert Simpson (Brockton, Mass.) ran it in from 2 yards out. The PAT by Bishop was good and UNH drove back to Durham with the 33-21 victory. UNH improves to 5-1, 2-1 CAA, while NU falls to 2-5 overall, 1-2 in conference play. Northeastern took the opening drive 65 yards down the field quickly and scored on a 1 yd TD plunge by Alex Broomfield to give the Huskies the early 7-0 lead following the PAT by Mat Johnson. UNH got on the board with their first drive of the game as well when senior Tom Bishop (Newfield, N.Y.) booted a 36 yard field goal through the uprights to cut the NU lead to four points, 7-3. Broomfield struck again at 8:36 of the second quarter with a four yard run to give Northeastern the 14-3 advantage after the made PAT. Bloomfield then caught a 17 yard pass from Anthony Orio with 28 seconds remaining for his third TD of the day before the half and the Huskies led 21-3. On UNH's final drive of the half, the Wildcats moved the ball to the NU 20 yard line with just two seconds left before intermission and UNH cut the lead to 21-6 after the second field goal of the day by Bishop, a 37-yarder as time expired. UNH came out in the second half fired up and quickly scored at 14:28 of the third quarter on a 31 yard pass play from Toman to sophomore wide receiver Terrance Fox (Piscataway, N.J.) to make the score 21-13 after the made PAT. UNH took advantage of a huge 49 yard kickoff return by Fox on the opening second half kickoff that gave the Wildcats the ball on NU's own 39 yard line. The UNH defense forced a Husky punt and on the Wildcat's very next possession Toman hit senior wide receiver Mike Boyle in the endzone with 5:36 to play in the third quarter for a 14 yard touchdown strike. The two-point conversion pass attempt by Toman was no good and UNH trailed by just two points, 21-19. The UNH defense made another big fourth down stop to take over with the football on the UNH 40 yard line. The Wildcats then drove with down to the NU 16 yard line where Toman completed the game-winning pass to Sicko. Fox recorded his first career 100 yard receiving game after making eight catches for 103 yards and the one touchdown. He also finished the afternoon with 174 all-purpose yards. Toman completed 25 of 36 passes for 277 yards and no interceptions and the Wildcats were led in rushing by Simpson with 11 carries for 40 yards and one TD. As a team, UNH outgained NU by a 390-310 yard margin. Defensively, the Wildcats were led in tackles by three players including junior Sean Ware (Bristol, Conn.) who had seven unassisted tackles, and senior linebacker and tri-captain Matt Parent (Long Beach, Calif.), who had seven tackles, an interception and a tackle for a loss. In addition, sacks were recorded by Brian McNally and Kevin Peters. Both had two tackles for a loss as well.

UNH RECORDS 500TH ALL-TIME VICTORY WITH 42-14 WIN OVER TOWSON: DURHAM, N.H. -- R.J. Toman (Mission Viejo, Calif.) completed 20 of 26 passes for 292 yards and four touchdowns to lead the 10th-ranked University of New Hampshire football team to Saturday afternoon's 42-14 victory against Towson University in CAA action at Cowell Stadium. The victory marked the 500th in the history of the UNH football program, which dates back to 1893. UNH, which has won all five meetings in the series vs. Towson, improved to 6-1 overall and 3-1 in the CAA. Towson is now 3-5, 1-3. Terrance Fox (Piscataway, N.J.) caught four passes for 103 yards, including a 40-yard TD reception. Mike Boyle (Plymouth, N.H.) had three catches, two for TD's, for 63 yards. Robert Simpson (Brockton, Mass.) ran for a team-best 85 yards including tying his career-high 68-yard

touchdown run, which he also posted in 2005 vs. Towson. Defensively, Ryan Hinds (Toronto, Ontario) had a pair of interceptions including a 74-yard return touchdown for the game's first tally, while Ryan McGuinness (Howell, N.J.) recorded a team-best 13 tackles. The Wildcats scored 28 points in a span of 10:34 in the second quarter to break a 7-7 tie and take a commanding 35-7 lead into halftime. The outburst began with a 48-yard strike from Toman over the top of the defense to Boyle in the end zone at 11:09. Simpson's 68-yard end-around to the left side extended the UNH lead to 21-7 at 7:08. The 'Cats then marched 48 yards in six plays and took a 28-7 lead at 2:18 on a 12-yard pass play in which Toman rolled to the left and found Boyle in the end zone. On the ensuing Towson drive, Hinds intercepted Sean Schaeffer's pass at the UNH 29 yard-line and returned it 35 yards to give the 'Cats possession at the Towson 36 with 1:14 to play. UNH quickly advanced the ball to the TU 7 and then Sean Jellison (Amherst, N.H.) caught Toman's pass in the left flat and ran into the endzone to increase the margin to 35-7 with 35 seconds remaining in the second quarter. UNH opened the game with a six-play drive that ended with a turnover on downs at the Wildcats 28-yard line. The Tigers were marching until Hinds picked off a Sean Schaefer pass and returned it 74 yards for the score. TU answered with a 12-play 74-yard scoring drive that ending with a six-yard run by Matt Castor to make it 7-7. Neither team converted on a pair of third-quarter possessions as the Wildcats held a 35-7 lead heading into the final stanza. UNH didn't wait long as it scored seven seconds into the fourth on a 40-yard TD-strike from Toman to Fox to extend the lead to 42-7. On the following possession, the Tigers produced an eight-play 63-yard drive that ending with a four-yard touchdown pass from Schaefer to John Godlasky that completed scoring at 42-14. Tom Bishop (Newfield, N.Y.) was a perfect six-for-six in extra point conversions, while Towson's Mark Bencivengo made both extra-point opportunities, yet missed a 38-yard field goal attempt. Head coach Sean McDonnell has been a part of 142 of UNH's 500 victories. He has led the Wildcats to 66 victories in his 10 years at the helm. The 'Cats won 53 games in his eight-year stint (1991-98) as an assistant coach and 23 in his three-year playing career.

UNH DEFENSE COMES UP WITH SEVEN TURNOVERS IN 45-25 WIN OVER HOFSTRA: The defense forced seven turnovers, including two interception returns for touchdowns by John Clements and Dino Vasso, to propel the ninth-ranked University of New Hampshire football team to Saturday afternoon's 45-25 victory against Hofstra University in CAA action at Cowell Stadium. UNH, which compiled 207 interception return yards, won its third consecutive game to improve to 7-1 overall and 4-1 in the CAA while Hofstra lost for the third time in as many weeks to fall to 3-6, 1-4. Hofstra capitalized on a UNH fumble – caused and recovered by the Pride's Luke Bonus – to set up a 45-yard field goal by Roger Williams to take a 3-0 lead at 12:46 of the first quarter. On the visitor's next possession, a bad exchange by The Pride offense put the ball on the ground and UNH's John Clements (Hammonton, N.J.) recovered at the HU 38-yard line. The Wildcats did not take advantage, however, as junior running back Sean Jellison (Amherst, N.H.) was short of a first down on a 4th-and-3 play from the HU 31. A Hugo Souza (Marshfield, Mass.) interception gave the Wildcats 1st-and-10 at the HU 19, but the Pride defense turned aside the threat on 3rd-and-goal from the 1-yard line on a Leslie Jackman interception at the goal line. Three plays later, Clements intercepted the ball at the Hofstra 47 and raced along the UNH sideline to the

end zone to give UNH a 7-3 lead at 4:46 of the first quarter. In the second quarter junior tight end Scott Sicko (Stillwater, N.Y.) capped a three-play 84 yard drive with an 11-yard touchdown reception, his first of two on the day from junior quarterback R.J. Toman (Mission Viejo, Calif.), at 11:09 to make it 14-3 UNH. However, Hofstra struck again at 5:55 of the second stanza on a 10 yard pass play from freshman Steve Probst to Everette Benjamin and the UNH lead was cut to 14-9 after the PAT. Sicko scored his second TD of the day at 3:07 of the second quarter on a 9 yard pass from Toman that put the Wildcats on top 21-9 before the half after the PAT by senior kicker Tom Bishop (Newfield, N.Y.) The score was set up on a fumble recovery by sophomore defensive end Brian McNally (Cornwall, N.Y.). In the second half UNH increased its advantage to 24-9 on a 27 yard field goal by Bishop with 0:29 to play in the third quarter after a time-consuming 15-play, 70 yard drive that chewed up 6:53 off the clock. An interception return of 88 yards by junior defensive back Ryan Hinds (Toronto, Ont.) gave the Wildcats the football on the Hofstra 3 yard line and senior running back Robert Simpson (Brockton, Mass.) finished it off with a 3 yard touchdown run to give UNH a 31-9 advantage with 11:22 to play in the contest. After a 1 yd touchdown run by Aaron Weaver with 8:44 to play to cut the lead to 31-17 following a made two-point conversion pass to Benjamin, Simpson struck again, running 58 yards down the far sideline for his second TD run of the half to put UNH up 38-17 with 8:06 to go. Sophomore defensive back Dino Vasso (Crum Lynne, Pa.) then grabbed his second interception of the game and ran it back 66 yards for a touchdown to put the game away for the Wildcats, 45-17 with 4:51 remaining in the contest. Simpson finished the game with 16 carries for 131 yards and 2 TDs to lead all rushers on the day, while Toman completed 14 of 24 passes for 140 yards and a pair of TDs. Hofstra was led by Weaver who recorded 305 all-purpose yards, including a school record 254 kick return yards. Defensively UNH was led by Vasso with a game-high 12 tackles (7-5-12), a forced fumble, two interceptions (one on the 66 yard return) and a tackle for a loss. Right behind Vasso was Clements with 10 total tackles (3-7-10), the interception return of 47 yards and a fumble recovery.

UNH SUFFERS LOSS AT NO. 6 VILLANOVA, 24-13: Wide receiver Phil Atkinson scored with 8:56 to play on a 17-yard run after a long pitch by quarterback Chris Whitney to lead No. 6 Villanova to a 24-13 victory over the University of New Hampshire on Saturday. Villanova improves its record to 7-2 overall, 5-1 CAA, while UNH fell to 7-2 overall and 4-2 in conference. UNH sophomore quarterback R.J. Toman (Mission Viejo, Calif.) completed 18 of 28 passes for 264 yards and no interceptions and senior wide receiver Mike Boyle (Plymouth, N.H.) had five catches for 101 yards on the day to lead the 'Cats. Leading UNH in rushing was senior running back Robert Simpson (Brockton, Mass.) with 12 carries for 53 yards and one TD. The UNH defense continued to create turnovers for the third straight week as junior linebacker Sean Ware (Bristol, Conn.) picked off a pass by Chris Whitney and returned the ball 26 yards to the Villanova 34 yard line. On the ensuing drive, senior running back Simpson ran the ball in three yards for the touchdown at 4:18 of the first quarter to give UNH a 7-0 lead following the PAT by senior placekicker/punter Tom Bishop (Newfield, N.Y.). Also playing well during the drive was junior running back Chad Kackert (Simi Valley, Calif.) who was making a return from a shoulder injury. Villanova answered in its first drive of the second quarter when quarterback Antwon Young ran it in from three yards out

with 12:28 to play in the first half. After the PAT the contest was tied 7-7. UNH drove the ball to the 19 yard line to set up a 36 yard field goal by Bishop that gave UNH a 10-7 advantage with 9:31 left in the second quarter. The field goal capped an 8-play, 53-yard drive that took 2:57 off the clock. Villanova took the lead at 5:17 of the second quarter on a 5 yard pass play from Young to wide receiver Brandyn Harvey and Villanova took a four-point lead, 14-10. The TD pass capped an impressive 9-play 69 yard drive using 4:06 off the clock and that was the score as both teams headed into their respective lockerrooms at the half. UNH opened up the third quarter with a long, sustained drive of 14 plays for 68 yards (8:07 TOP) that featured several good runs by Simpson and Kackert and a tremendous 21 yard reception by sophomore Terrance Fox (Piscataway, N.J.). Bishop then booted a 23-yard field goal, his second of the day, to cut the Villanova lead to one, 14-13 with 6:53 to play in the third quarter. Following the field goal UNH attempted on side kick recovered by Villanova but then fumbled and recovered by Simpson to give UNH the football on the UNH 30 yard line, but UNH was unable to capitalize. After a shanked Villanova punt that went only 20 yards, UNH took over from the VU 34 yard line with outstanding field position, but was unable to score a touchdown, which set up a 43-yard field goal by Bishop that had the distance but hit the right upright and bounced back out. Villanova's Joe Marcoux booted a 35-yard field goal with 1:33 left to play to ice the victory for the home team. Leading the way for the UNH defense was sophomore defensive back Dino Vasso (Crum Lynne, Pa.) with 9-1-10 and Ware had the interception for UNH and six tackles, one for a loss.

NO. 13 UNH FOOTBALL ROLLS OVER NO. 22 UMASS, 52-21:

DURHAM, N.H. – Matt Parent (Long Beach, Calif.) recorded six tackles, two fumble recoveries and a 100-yard interception return for a touchdown to lead the 13th-ranked University of New Hampshire football team to Saturday afternoon's 52-21 CAA victory against 22nd-ranked University of Massachusetts on Senior Day at Cowell Stadium. UNH improves to 8-2 overall and 5-2 in the CAA while UMass is now 6-5, 3-4. Parent was named the recipient of the 23rd Annual Bill Knight Award, which is presented to the most outstanding player in the game between these programs. He is the third defensive player to earn the award. The Wildcats' defense forced six turnovers and five three-and-outs in 15 Minutemen possessions. UNH's balanced offense amassed 326 rushing yards and 295 passing yards for a total of 621 yards. R.J. Toman (Mission Viejo, Calif.) completed 10 of 18 attempts for 295 yards and four touchdowns; he also had a 43-yard rushing TD and 61 yards on the ground. Mike Boyle (Plymouth, N.H.) had four receptions for 147 yards and one TD, and he also had two carries for 42 yards. Chris Jeannot (Moon Township, Pa.) caught two passes – both for scores – for 92 yards. Robert Simpson (Brockton, Mass.) was UNH's top rusher with 125 yards on 23 carries. Chad Kackert (Simi Valley, Calif.) scored once on the ground and once through the air and had a total of 128 yards (86 rushing, 42 receiving). For UMass, Tony Nelson went over 1,000 yards on the season during his 24-carry, 154-yard effort. Liam Cruz had nine receptions for 80 yards as the top target for Liam Coen, who was 22-for-41 for 211 yards, one TD and four interceptions. Defensively, Jeremy Miles was credited with a game-high 18 tackles. Sparked by Parent's 100-yard interception return, UNH raced out to a 24-0 lead in the first quarter. The Wildcats took a 3-0 lead on a Tom Bishop (Newfield, N.Y.) career-long 46-yard field goal at 13:34. On the subsequent UMass possession, the Minutemen faced 3rd-and-goal at the

UNH 6 and Coen's pass intended for Joe Sanford was deflected at the goal line by Dino Vasso (Crum Lynne, Pa.). Parent caught the ball and, surrounded by a fleet of blockers, rumbled down the left sideline for the TD at 9:30. New Hampshire's defense immediately gained the ball back on a Devon Jackson (Williamstown, N.J.) interception that gave the 'Cats possession at the UM 43. On the next play, Toman faked a handoff to Kackert on an end around and ran up the middle untouched for a 43-yard TD run at 7:30 that gave UNH a 17-0 lead. UMass then faced 4th-and-6 at the UNH 37 and Coen fumbled on a hit by T.J. Taylor (Erie, Pa.) in the backfield. Parent picked up the ball at the UNH 47 and advanced the ball to the UM 48. The 'Cats once again struck quickly, as Kackert scampered into the end zone on the next play to extend the lead to 24-0 at 2:43. UNH's defense then forced a three-and-out, and the 'Cats marched 91 yards in seven plays – capped by Toman's 30-yard completion over the top of the defense to Kackert in the front-right corner of the end zone – to build a 31-0 lead at 13:10 of the second quarter. Chris Zardas' one-yard TD run trimmed the margin to 31-7 at 9:20. The three-play, 11-yard drive was set up by Terrence Farris' punt block. UNH gained possession with 1:55 remaining in the first half. The Minutemen held UNH to a pair of one-yard losses and called time out at 1:14, but Toman found Jeannot at the UNH 35 and he ran down the left sideline and, aided a downfield block by Travis Negron (San Diego, Calif.), into the end zone for a 77-yard pass play that gave New Hampshire a 38-7 lead with 59 seconds to play in the half. UMass failed to gain a first down to start the third quarter, then UNH marched 85 yards on 14 plays – the last was a 20-yard strike from Toman to Boyle – to extend its advantage to 45-7 at 8:34. The Minutemen pulled within 45-14 with 23 seconds left in the third quarter when Coen connected with Matt Silver on a play-action pass play on 3rd-and-goal from the UNH 1. Nelson's three-yard TD run made the score 45-21 at 10:38 of the fourth quarter and Jeannot's second touchdown catch of the day, this time from 15 yards, capped the scoring at 7:46.
