THE MATCHUP

The University of New Hampshire women's hockey team, ranked third in both of this week's national polls, is 7-1-3 overall with a 3-1-2 record in Hockey East. The Wildcats play top-ranked University of Wisconsin (12-0-2, 8-0-2 WCHA) in a two-game series at the Fort Myers Skatium in Fort Myers, Florida, on Nov. 21-22. Both games will be videostreamed live on USCHO.com.

UNH has a 6-0-1 lifetime record, including two wins last season, against Wisconsin. The teams have met once at a neutral site, and the 'Cats prevailed 2-1 on Nov. 27, 2005 at Dartmouth College's Thompson Arena.

This series began in the 2002 season and UNH won twice by shutout at the Whittemore Center. The following year in Madison, Wisconsin, the Wildcats recorded a 2-0 win and the teams skated to a 1-1 tie.

Last year at the Whittemore Center, UNH won both games by a 2-1 score. In the series opener, Hilary Knight gave the Badgers a 1-0 lead at 13:47 of the second period and UW held that lead at the second intermission. UNH scored goals 3:38 apart—at 12:21 and 15:59—in the third period to take a 2-1 lead. Wisconsin pulled goaltender Jessie Vetter (24 saves) with 36 seconds to play and went on the power play 12 seconds later to gain a two-skater advantage, but did not get a shot on goal. UNH goalie Kayley Herman finished with 19 saves. UW went 1-for-7 on the power play and UNH was 0-for-2 with a 26-20 shot advantage.

New Hampshire took an early 1-0 lead the next day with a goal at 1:51 of the opening stanza. UNH held that one-goal advantage until the Badgers struck at 2:06 of the third period. The 'Cats immediately seized back momentum with a penalty kill and a goal to regain the lead at 4:45. For the second time in as many days, UW had a two skater advantage for the final 24 seconds of regulation with a Wildcat in the penalty box and Vetter on the bench in favor of an extra skater. Once again, the 'Cats kept the Badgers at bay to secure the victory.

In the two-game series, Herman stopped 41 of 43 shots for a .953 save percentage against a team that was averaging 3.92 goals per game.

UNH ANNOUNCES "OPERATION HAT TRICK"

The University of New Hampshire athletic department recently announced the creation of a special project called "Operation Hat Trick," an initiative that will give baseball hats to injured military personnel.

For every two hats that are sold (suggested retail price of \$19.95 each), a third will be donated to the VA Hospital's Recreation Therapy program. Six local retailers, including an online provider, have committed to the project by selling the hats through their outlets. The retailers are: UNH Bookstore, Hayden Sports, Town & Campus, Sportdesigns.com, Friends of Men's Hockey, Friends of Women's Hockey and UNH Athletics.

Operation Hat Trick will be launched at the UNH men's hockey game versus Providence on Saturday, Nov. 22, with women's hockey having its special presentation Friday, Dec. 5 versus Harvard. Members of the hockey team will wear Operation Hat Trick hats during introductions and then toss each personally autographed hat into the crowd. Three team-signed hats will be raffled off and proceeds will go to the VA Hospital Recreation Therapy program. Shortly after the game, members of each hockey team

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

New Hampshire opened the 2009 season with 10 games in 25 days and the Wildcats compiled a 6-1-3 record, including a 1-1-3 mark against nationally-ranked teams.

Twelve of 14 skaters recorded a point in the 7-1 win at Maine on Nov. 14. Jenn Wakefield led four multiple-point scorers with two goals and two assists for four points.

The Wildcats limited Maine to eight shots, and that was preceded by a game in which they held Vermont to 12 shots for a total of 20 shots yielded in two games.

New Hampshire has scored a power-play goal in 8 of 11 games this season. The 'Cats have scored six power-play goals in the last three games, including four at Maine last weekend. UNH has yielded a power-play goal in 7 of 11 games.

UNH had just one loss through 10 games for the fifth time in head coach Brian McCloskey's seven-year tenure.

The Wildcats were idle from Nov. 2 to Nov. 13 and – other than the annual holiday break – it marked the first time UNH did not play a game during a week in regular-season play since February 2001.

UNH has trailed in the third period in four of six Hockey East games this season. They rallied to tie both BC, UConn and BU (Oct. 30) but lost at BU (Oct. 23). UNH has not faced a third-period deficit in any of its five non-league games.

WHO'S HOT

Three UNH Wildcats carry lengthy streaks into the weekend series against Wisconsin. Kelly Paton extended her point-scoring streak to 11 games with a goal at Maine. Jenn Wakefield pushed her goal-scoring streak to eight games with two tallies in that game; she has recorded a point in all nine games played this season. Angela Taylor extended her assist streak to six games with one at Maine.

OFFENSIVE OUTPUT

New Hampshire has outscored the opposition 14-4 in the second period with a 115-66 shot advantage in that stanza. In comparison, UNH's scoring advantage is five goals (14-9) in the first period and two (12-10) in final frame.

UNH has scored a goal in 24 of 33 periods (excluding overtimes) this season, and that includes four games in which the 'Cats scored at least once in all three periods.

The four power-play goals and seven goals overall Nov. 14 at Maine were single-game highs this season for the Wildcats. The four first-period goals also marked the highest single-period total.

Yale struck three times in the third period Oct. 25. UNH had not yielded three goals in any period since the 2007 NCAA quarterfinal loss to St. Lawrence on March 10, 2007 (first period).

YOU ALWAYS REMEMBER YOUR FIRST

Freshman forward Sarah Cuthbert, who came to UNH as a defenseman but made the switch early in the season, recorded her first collegiate point with a goal at Maine on Nov. 14.

Sophomore defenseman Raylen Dziengelewski scored her first career goal with a tally against Vermont on Nov. 1.

Julie Allen, a sophomore transfer from Sheridan College, tallied her first points in a two-assist game against Yale on Oct. 25, and Allen scored her first goal in the next game against Boston University.

Kelly Cahill, a junior transfer from The Ohio State University, tallied her first point as a UNH Wildcat with a goal Oct. 11 at Niagara.

against the top-ranked team.

A 4-1 victory Dec. 14, 2007 against Harvard University marked the team's fourth consecutive win in matchups against the No. 1 ranked team. Earlier in the season, the Wildcats swept a two-game home series against then No. 1 Wisconsin on Nov. 17-18.

Prior to the 2008 season, the last time UNH faced off against a #1-ranked team was Nov. 27, 2005, when the 'Cats defeated Wisconsin. All three games vs. the Badgers ended with a 2-1 score.

A handful of Wildcats are ranked among the national leaders. Jenn Wakefield is No. 5 in points per game (1.78), sixth in goals per game (1.11), eighth in power-play goals (four) and second in game-winning goals (two). Sam Faber is tied for the lead in shorthanded goals (two), and she is 15th in goals (0.73 gpg) and 17th in points (1.36 ppg). Angela Taylor is 14th in assists (0.96 apg) while Kelly Paton is 17th in points (1.36) and Kacey Bellamy is 16th in defenseman scoring (0.73 ppg).

CASTING HER OWN SHADOW

Senior defenseman Kacey Bellamy has played in the shadow of two-time All-America selection Martine Garland, but, as evident by her role as captain in 2009, Bellamy is ready to have the spotlight shine on her.

Bellamy, who has a team-high +10 plus/minus rating, did not record a point in the Oct. 8 season opener vs. 10th-ranked BC, but she scored the only goal in the shootout -- in the sudden-death fifth round -- to lift UNH to victory and become the answer to the trivia question: Who scored the first shootout goal in the history of women's Hockey East?

Bellamy tallied a pair of assists, including one on the game-tying goal, in the 3-3 tie at 10th-ranked UConn on Oct. 15. She also recorded a multiple-point game with a goal and an assist against sixth-ranked St. Lawrence on Oct. 18 and had a two-assist effort in UNH's most recent action -- a 7-1 win at Maine on Nov. 14.

With eight points (one goal, seven assists) this season, Bellamy has climbed from #11 to #9 on UNH's defensemen career points list. She enters the weekend with 22 goals and 65 assists for 87 points.

Bellamy, a two-time Hockey East Second Team All-Star and Hockey East All-Tournament Team honoree, received UNH's 2008 Colleen Coyne Award as the team's top defenseman.

TWO 'CATS SKATE AT FOUR NATIONS CUP

UNH was idle while a pair of Wildcats competed at the Four Nations Cup in Lake Placid, New York in early November. Kacey Bellamy skated on the gold-medal U.S. team while Jenn Wakefield was on the silver-medal Canadian team. Wakefield scored a second-period goal in Canada's tourney opener, a 6-0 win against Finland.

Bellamy also competed at the Four Nations Cup in 2006 and 2007, and in both years she made an impact upon her return to the Wildcats. Last year, she recorded two assists in a two-game series against (top-ranked) Wisconsin. In 2006, Bellamy tallied a career-high three assists against (nationally-ranked) St. Lawrence in her first game back, and that was the beginning of a six-game point-scoring streak.

Wakefield also competed at the 2007 Four Nations Cup and helped Canada to a gold medal. She netted a goal in the opening round-robin game last year, as she did this year.

FABERLICIOUS

Senior forward and assistant captain Sam Faber led UNH in both assists and points in the 2007 and 2008 seasons. This year through 11 games, Faber is tied for second in points (15) and tied for fourth in assists with seven. She is second in goals (eight) as well as third in both shooting percentage (.195) and shots (41), and fourth in plus/minus (+7).

In six Hockey East league games, Faber has tallied team highs in both goals (six) and points (eight).

Faber opened the year with a point in four consecutive games and tallied 4-4-8 in that span. She carries a four-game point-scoring streak (3-3-6) into this week's action. Overall, Faber has recorded a point in 9 of 11 games with four multiple-point efforts.

The senior assistant captain scored UNH's first goal of the 2009 season when she gave the Wildcats a 1-0 first-period lead with a shorthanded goal

against Boston College on Oct. 8. Faber has two shorthanded tallies this year and seven in her career.

She already attained a personal milestone with her 150th career point, which came on the last of her three points Oct. 11 at Niagara.

Faber is the Wildcats' active career leader in goals (72), assists (89) and points (161). On the program's career leaderboards, those numbers rank 14th in goals, seventh in assists and 10th in points.

Faber's 2008 accolades included Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award Top 10 Finalist, Hockey East First Team All-Star and Hockey East Tournament MVP. She was also UNH's Karyn Bye Award (MVP) recipient.

THAT'S A PLUS

Senior defenseman Kacey Bellamy and junior forward Kelly Paton lead the 'Cats in plus/minus at +10. Courtney Sheary is next at +9 and she is followed by Sam Faber, Maggie Joyce and Jenn Wakefield at +7.

READY TO BREAK OUT

Coming from an off-season in which she captained Great Britain to a gold medal at the IIHF World Championship -- and garnered honors as the most outstanding forward -- senior forward and assistant captain Angela Taylor is primed for a breakout season.

Taylor leads the team in assists with 10, a total that exceeds her previous single-season high (nine) established as a freshman in 2006, and she is fourth overall in points (11).

Taylor has recorded at least one assist each of the last six games with totals of 0-8-8 in that span. She matched her career high of two assists in consecutive games against Yale (Oct. 25) and Boston University (Oct. 30). Taylor recorded one point in each of the first three games this season with an assist on the game-tying goal in the Oct. 8 opener vs. Boston College, followed by a goal (Oct. 11) and an assist (Oct. 12) at Niagara.

Taylor has already surpassed last year's totals of 1-5-6 (38 games played).

CONSECUTIVE LOSSES A RARITY FOR 'CATS

In the history of Hockey East (2003 season-present), UNH has never lost consecutive Hockey East regular-season games, and the Wildcats have never lost consecutive regular-season games to any single Hockey East team. Both streaks were kept intact with a 2-2 tie against eighth-ranked Boston University on Oct. 30. The Terriers had defeated UNH, 3-2, in the Wildcats' previous league game.

The last team to win consecutive meetings in a series vs. New Hampshire was Mercyhurst in the 2007 and 2008 seasons.

In general, back-to-back losses aren't very commonplace for the Wildcats. Following the loss to BU, UNH responded to defeat Yale. The 'Cats have not lost consecutive games since the 2005 season, when they fell to Mercyhurst (Nov. 28, 2004) and Dartmouth (Dec. 1).

SIZABLE IMPACT

Kelly Paton stands just over five feet tall (at 5-1), but her impact on the ice is quite sizable. Paton is the only Wildcats who has recorded a point in all 11 games this season – the 11-game point-scoring streak is a personal best – and she is tied for the team lead plus/minus (+10). She is tied for second in both assists (eight) and points (15). Furthermore, Paton is second in shooting percentage (.259) and third in goals (seven).

Paton has four multiple-point efforts this season, including 1-1-2 Nov. 1 against Vermont and a two-goal performance Oct. 12 at Niagara; the two goals matched her career high, and she duplicated that total Oct. 25 against Yale.

Paton made an impact in the 2008-09 opener by setting up the team's first goal of the season Oct. 8 against Boston College. She intercepted a pass in the neutral zone and pushed the puck forward to spring Sam Faber for her shorthanded breakaway goal. Paton matched her career high of two goals Oct. 12 at Niagara, and she tallied an assist Oct. 15 at 10th-ranked UConn.

A TOUGH ACT TO FOLLOW

Jenn Wakefield has a tough act to follow – her own. She had a phenomenal rookie season in '08 with 27 goals and 19 assists for 46 points in 33 games to rank No. 2 in the nation among rookie scorers (1.39 ppg) as well as fourth overall in goals per game, 10th in points per game and 18th in power-play goals (seven).

So far, the second act has lived up to its billing. Wakefield has tallied a point in all nine games she has played this season – she missed two UNH games due to her commitment with Hockey Canada at the Four Nations Cup – and carries an eight-game goal-scoring streak into the weekend series vs. Wisconsin.

The nine-game point streak breaks the mark of eight she established during her rookie season.

The eight-game goal streak is the longest by a 'Cat since current teammate Sam Faber had an eight-game streak in Jan-Feb '06.

Wakefield leads the Wildcats in goals (10), power-play goals (four), game-winning goals (three), points (16) and shots (54). She is fourth in shooting percentage (.185) and tied for fourth in plus/minus (+7).

Wakefield matched her career highs in goals (two), assists (two) and points (four) – and scored the game-winning goal – in road games against Maine (Nov. 14) and Niagara (Oct. 11).

Wakefield was crowned the 2008 Hockey East Scoring Champion with 33 points in league play. Her other Hockey East accolades included First Team All-Star, Rookie of the Year, All-Tournament Team and two-time Rookie of the Month.

SITUATIONAL STATS

In five road games this season, Jenn Wakefield has amassed 12 points on seven goals and five assists. Sam Faber (4-4-8), Courtney Birchard (2-6-8) and Kelly Paton (3-3-6) have been some of the other top point producers on the road this season.

The Wildcats have played five games against nationally-ranked teams, and Paton leads the way with six points (one goal, five assists). Faber (4-0-4), Wakefield (1-3-4) and Taylor (0-4-4) all have four points, although Wakefield's totals are in four games, not five.

GETTING DEFENSIVE

In addition to captain Kacey Bellamy, senior assistant captain Maggie Joyce and the return of both Courtney Sheary and Raylen Dziengelewski form a solid nucleus for the defense, which also welcomes newcomers Kelly Cahill and Sarah Cuthbert.

Joyce, more renown for her physical play and defense than her offensive contributions, recorded an assist in consecutive games against nationally-ranked opponents UConn (Oct. 15) and St. Lawrence (Oct. 18) this season. She helped secure the 3-2 victory against SLU by clearing the puck out of the defensive zone in the closing seconds. She also tallied an assist – and was on the ice almost every second in all of the team's penalty kills – at Boston U. on Oct. 23. She scored her first goal of the season – sixth of her career – last weekend at Maine.

Sheary, who redshirted the 2008 season, is a strong skater and will make more of an impact on the offensive end of the ice this season. She has recorded four points (all on assists) in 11 games this year; she tallied an assist in each of the last two games and in three of four.

Dziengelewski missed the last six games of her 2008 rookie season – and eight games overall – due to illness. She has been strong at the start of the '09 season despite the heavy number of minutes played. Dziengelewski scored her first collegiate goal Nov. 1 against Vermont, and her power-play goal gave UNH a 1-0 first-period lead.

Cahill, a transfer from The Ohio State University, watched the UNH team from the stands during the spring 2008 semester. As a freshman at OSU in the 2006 season, she tallied three goals and nine assists for 12 points in 19 games. She had not seen ice time until this year's Oct. 8 season opener vs. Boston College. Cahill recorded her first point as a UNH Wildcat with a power-play goal Oct. 11 at Niagara that gave the 'Cats a 1-0 lead. She also tallied an assist at UConn (Oct. 15). She missed two games (vs. Boston U. and Vermont) but returned to the lineup at Maine (Nov. 14).

Cuthbert comes to the UNH program from the North American Hockey Academy, where she recorded 38 points (8g, 30a) last season. She earned All-Scholastic Team honors from both *The Boston Globe* and *Boston Herald* in 2007, when she captained the Falmouth High School team. She has skated at center, however, since the season opener.

AN OVERLOOKED FORWARD

Sophomore forward Courtney Birchard missed nine games last year due to injury and another due to a commitment with Hockey Canada. So while classmate Jenn Wakefield garnered her well-deserved accolades, Birchard went almost unnoticed as she compiled 21 points (8g, 13a) in 28 games.

This season, Birchard is tied for second on the team in assists (eight) and is fifth in points (10); she is also second in shots (48). Birchard has tallied an assist in 7 of 11 games and her season highlights include a three-point effort (2-1-3) Oct. 12 at Niagara; the two goals matched her career high. That was the second of four consecutive games with an assist. Birchard also tallied an assist in consecutive games at Boston U. and vs. Yale. She matched her career high of two assists Nov. 14 at Maine.

HOME ICE ADVANTAGE

UNH is 53-0-9 in home league regular-season games since the inception of Hockey East in the 2003 season. The 'Cats are also 2-0 in postseason Hockey East home games. The Hockey East teams that have skated to a tie against New Hampshire at the Whittemore Center are Providence (three), UConn (two), Boston College (two), Boston University and Maine.

ANOTHER OVERLOOKED FORWARD

While other forwards often grab the headlines, junior Micaela Long is a consistent point producer. She is fourth on the team in goals with four, and she has potted a goal in three of the last five games with 3-2-5 in that span. Half of Long's four goals have come on the power play, which makes her one of three 'Cats with multiple power-play goals this season. Long ranks fourth in shots (36).

THE PUCK STOPS HERE

Kayley Herman is coming off a record-breaking freshman campaign in 2008. This year, she has started all 11 games and is 7-1-3 with a 1.94 GAA and .905 save percentage.

Herman recorded a season-high 25 saves in UNH's 3-2 win against (then No. 6) St. Lawrence on Oct. 18. She has made 20+ saves four other times this season and did so in four consecutive games from Oct. 11 through Oct. 18.

Herman stopped 19 of 21 shots in the 2-2 tie against the Eagles of Boston College on Oct. 8. She turned aside all five shots she faced in the shootout to backbone UNH to a 1-0 win that gave the 'Cats two points in the Hockey East standings.

QUICK STRIKE ATTACK

New Hampshire potted four goals in a span of 3:12 in the first period at Maine (Nov. 14). Sam Faber and Jenn Wakefield scored 5-on-3 power-play goals at 9:21 and 10:00, then Maggie Joyce netted a power-play goal at 10:54. Shannon Sisk completed the flurry of goals at 12:33.

UNH scored goals in rapid succession in the second period of both games at Niagara. The 'Cats potted goals 25 seconds apart Oct. 11 and 26 seconds apart Oct. 12.

New Hampshire's quick-strike attack continued Oct. 15 at UConn when the Wildcats netted goals 21 seconds apart in the third period to erase a two-goal deficit and pull even, 3-3. UNH scored twice in a 60-second span midway through the first period against Clarkson on Oct. 19.

For the second time in 10 days, the 'Cats potted third-period goals in a 21-second span when Micaela Long and Shannon Sisk struck at 6:28 and 6:49, respectively, Oct. 25 against Yale.

WHAT'S NEW TO HOCKEY EAST IN 2009

Hockey East has introduced a shootout this season. The league will implement the NCAA's three-shooter system at the end of 65 minutes of play; beyond that, each subsequent round stands on its own. The CCHA men and WCHA women will also use this experimental system this season.

If tied at the end of overtime, both teams will earn one point and the winner of the shootout will gain another point in the league standings. UNH will utilize the shootout in all home games this season.

Hockey East expands its postseason field from four to six teams this season. The top two teams will receive a bye into the semifinals, whereas the No. 3 seed will host the No. 6 seed and the fourth seed will host the fifth seed (Feb 28/March 1) in a single-elimination game. The No. 1 seed will host the semifinals (March 7) and championship game (March 8); the top seed will play the lowest remaining seed in the semifinal round.

OT IS OK

Following the 2-2 tie against Boston University on Oct. 30, the Wildcats are 4-0-10 in their last 14 games decided by overtime. UNH was last defeated in overtime Nov. 5, 2005 at Boston College (3-2). UNH played three overtime games last season – all at home – and was 2-0-1 in those games, which included the NCAA quarterfinal against St. Lawrence.

This season, UNH is already 0-0-3 in three overtime games with the aforementioned tie vs. BU, a 3-3 tie at UConn (Oct. 15) and a 2-2 draw against Boston College (Oct. 8).

THE CENTURY CLUB

Sam Faber is one of 39 UNH Wildcats – the only active player – in the Century Club (100 career points). She reached the 100-point milestone Oct. 21, 2007, with the first of her two points at Boston University. Faber became the 13th UNH Wildcat to reach the 150-point milestone with the last of her three points Oct. 11 at Niagara University.

The closest active 'Cat to 100 career points is senior defenseman Kacey Bellamy, who has 87 points (22g, 65a).

FOUR STREAKS END IN ONE NIGHT

Boston University ended four UNH streaks in one game Oct. 23 at Walter Brown Arena. During the game, the Terriers ended the Wildcats' streak of successful penalty kills at 25 with a power-play goal in the first period. And with the 3-2 victory, BU ended New Hampshire's streak of 16 consecutive wins in the series. Furthermore, the win ended UNH's Hockey East record regular-season unbeaten streak at 40 games (36-0-4) and the league road unbeaten streak at 20 (19-0-1).

Prior to the Oct. 23 game at BU, the BC Eagles were the last league team to defeat the 'Cats (Nov. 2, 2006; 7-2; at Conte Forum).

DEJA VU ALL OVER AGAIN

For the third time in as many weeks, UNH played a weekday matchup against a Hockey East team ranked No. 10 in the nation when the 'Cats faced off against Boston University at Walter Brown Arena on Oct. 23 (3-2 loss). The Wildcats opened the season Wednesday, Oct. 8 against 10th-ranked Boston College (2-2 tie; UNH wins shootout 1-0). One week later on the 15th, the 'Cats skated to a 3-3 tie draw at 10th-ranked UConn (Huskies won the shootout 1-0). Both shootouts ended in Round 5.

The string of ranked mid-week opponents continued Oct. 30 at home, this time against eighth-ranked BU. The teams skated to a 2-2 tie and the Terriers prevailed 2-0 in the shootout.

'CATS FAVORED AGAIN IN HOCKEY EAST

New Hampshire garnered four of a possible seven first-place votes and 52 points overall to claim the No. 1 spot in the Hockey East Preseason Coaches Poll that was released Sept. 29. It marked the fifth consecutive year that the Wildcats took the top spot.

UNH welcomes five players, including junior Kelly Cahill and sophomore Julie Allen, to the program. Cahill lettered for The Ohio State University as a freshman defenseman in 2006, whereas Julie Allen attended Sheridan College for two years before coming to UNH. Allen tallied her first points as a Wildcat with a two-assist effort Oct. 25 against Yale, then she potted her first goal Oct. 30 vs. Boston University.

Sarah Cuthbert, Brittany Skudder and Lindsey Minton form this year's freshman class.

Cuthbert comes to the UNH program from the North American Hockey Academy, where she recorded 38 points (8g, 30a) last season. She earned All-Scholastic Team honors from both *The Boston Globe* and *Boston Herald* in 2007, when she captained the Falmouth High School team.

Skudder also attended North American Hockey Academy last year and she recorded 65 goals and 42 assists for 107 points. She has been sidelined by injury this season.

Minton travels to Durham from Richardson, Texas. She has played on teams from Dallas, Chicago and Colorado. Minton made her collegiate debut Oct. 25 against Yale and she played the last 20 minutes in the Nov. 14 win at Maine.

SKATING STRIDES

The third annual "Skating Strides Against Breast Cancer" has grown into a two-weekend event and features eight games between Jan. 29 and Feb. 8 with at least one event on every WHEA campus. UNH will play host to Boston College on Jan. 29 (7 p.m.) as part of the event.

The event is intended to work with the specific charities to raise awareness for both the league and the specific cause. In the initial year, close to \$20,000 was donated back to local breast cancer charities (Friends of Mel's Foundation and the American Cancer Society), vastly exceeding expectations. Last year, over \$30,000 dollars was raised.

WAKEFIELD EARNS TWO PLAYER OF THE WEEK HONORS

Sophomore forward Jenn Wakefield was named Pure Hockey Player of the Week by Hockey East on Oct. 13. She was also named Offensive Player of the Week by USCHO.

She recorded three goals and four assists for seven points to help UNH to a 2-0-1 week. She tallied two goals, including the game-winner, and two assists Oct. 11 at Niagara to match her career highs in goals, assists and points; she recorded a point on each of the team's first four tallies in that 5-3 win.

Wakefield followed that with a multiple-point effort (1g, 1a) vs. the Purple Eagles in which she had the primary assist on the game-winning goal. In the Oct. 8 season opener vs. Boston College, Wakefield lifted UNH into a 2-2 tie with the primary assist on the game-tying goal that sent the game into overtime and subsequent shootout win.

Wakefield had a +5 rating on the week and also led the 'Cats in shots with 21.

OPENING ACT, PART I

New Hampshire has a 27-3-2 overall record in season openers that includes 12-2-1 at home (4-1-1 at the Whittemore Center) following Wednesday's 2-2 tie at home vs. Boston College. UNH is 6-0-1 in season openers dating back to a 4-3 loss to Ohio State to start the 2002 season. The Wildcats are 2-0-1 when opening the season against a league opponent. Prior to this season, the 'Cats upended Maine, 4-1, at home in the 2006 season and UConn, 4-2, on the road in the 2004 season.

OPENING ACT, PART II

UNH has a 25-5-2 record in home openers following the 2-2 tie against Boston College on Oct. 8. The Wildcats are 5-0-2 in the last seven home openers. The last loss was that setback to Ohio State in the '02 season. New Hampshire is 5-1-2 when the home opener is a league opponent. In Hockey East play, that includes the 2006 season win vs. Maine as well as a 1-1 tie vs. UConn in the '04 season in addition to Wednesday's draw.

HOME SWEET HOME

The Wildcats are unbeaten (4-0-2) at the Whittemore Center this season and they were very successful at defending home ice last season with a 17-1-1 record. In those 19 games, UNH outscored the opposition 80-20 (averages of 4.21 gpg/1.05 gpg) with a 665-291 shot advantage (35.0 per game/15.3 per game).

CELEBRATING 30+ YEARS OF EXCELLENCE

UNH, now in its 32nd year at the varsity level, is the winningest women's college hockey program in the United States with an overall record of 651-162-57 for a .781 winning percentage. In 31+ years, the Wildcats have won one national championship (1998; AWCHA), three Hockey East tournament championships, five Hockey East regular-season

titles, five ECAC tournament championships and four EAIAW championships.

The Wildcats became the first to reach the milestone of 600 victories in January 2007. Here is a time line for each century mark:

THE McCLOSKEY FILE

Brian McCloskey (Dartmouth '77) is in his seventh year at the helm of the Wildcats. He is a three-time Hockey East Coach of the Year recipient (2003, 2005, 2006) and was runner-up in both the 2003 and 2006 national Coach of the Year balloting. He has directed UNH to the NCAA Women's Ice Hockey Championship three consecutive years with three consecutive Hockey East tournament titles and five straight league regular-season crowns. The 'Cats advanced to the Frozen four in '06 and '08.

A Wildcat was honored as Player of the Year each of the first four years of Hockey East's existence. In addition, the ITECH Goaltending Champion award has been presented to a UNH goalie all six years and the Scoring Champion has four times been a Wildcat.

McCloskey has compiled a 172-36-22 overall record, including a 103-9-10-2 [wins (including shootouts)-losses-ties-shootout losses] mark in Hockey East, with 20+ wins all six seasons. In his first year (2003) as head coach of the program, he led the 'Cats to a 27-7-2 record, which is now the fifth-best single-season win mark behind those established in 2006 & 2008 (33), 1998 (31) and 2007 (28).

Under his tutelage, four players have received a total of five All-America honors and four have been honored as a Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award Top 10 Finalist.

THIS IS HOCKEY EAST

The Women's Hockey East Association proudly enters its seventh season of play after officially commencing league action in the fall of 2002. In six short years, the conference has emerged as one of the top women's ice hockey conferences in the nation, having sent three teams to the Frozen Four and five teams to the NCAA Tournament in the league's six-year existence, including New Hampshire's Frozen Four berth last season in Duluth, Minnesota. This season, Boston University and Agganis Arena will have the opportunity to showcase eastern hockey by hosting the Women's Frozen Four on March 20 and 22, 2009 in Boston.

In 2008, the New Hampshire Wildcats took home both their third straight regular-season and tournament championships. The University of Connecticut hosted the sixth annual tournament championship at Freitas Ice Forum and Terriers' head coach Brian Durocher was named Hockey East Coach of the Year, while UConn's Dominique Thibault earned Player of the Year honors. New Hampshire's Jenn Wakefield was also honored as the Hockey East Rookie of the Year. Maine senior forward Pam Patterson was named the league's Top Scholar-Athlete for the second straight season, as she headlined the list of 84 student-athletes named to the WHEA All-Academic Team.

Although the Women's Hockey East Association is still in its infancy, its member programs have storied histories that include several championships and individual awards at the highest levels of play. The first 14 ECAC championships were shared among New Hampshire, Northeastern and Providence, all charter members of Hockey East. Northeastern forward Brooke Whitney was named the recipient of the 2002 Patty Kazmaier Award as the nation's top female collegiate player, an honor first won by New Hampshire's Brandy Fisher in 1998. Had the award been in existence beforehand, it surely would have been won at some point by Cammi Granato, a three-time ECAC Player of the Year who led Providence to back-to-back championships in 1992 and 1993. Five years later, in 1998, alongside nine other alumni of what are now Hockey East programs, Granato

captained Team USA to the Olympic gold medal during the first Olympic tournament that featured women's ice hockey as a medal sport. Granato will be inducted into the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame in October for her contributions to the sport. Beginning with the 2008-09 season, the WHEA athletic directors have voted to honor the league Player of the Year with the newly named Cammi Granato Award.

SCOUTING THE BADGERS

The University of Wisconsin, ranked #1 in both national polls, is 12-0-2 overall and 8-0-2 in the WCHA following last weekend's sweep at North Dakota (5-1, 4-0); the Badgers are 2-0-2 against nationally-ranked teams and they are yet to face off against a Hockey East school

UW leads the nation in both defense (0.93 gpg) and penalty kill (.932), and the Badgers are No. 2 in offense (4.86 gpg) and power play (.347).

Wisconsin's offense is more potent each period with 16 goals in the first period, 23 in the second and 29 in the third. UW has scored the game's first goal in 11 of 14 games.

A total of 10 skaters have already reached double-digit points and Hilary Knight leads the way with 25 (16-9-25). She is followed by Brooke Ammerman (14-5-19), Erika Lawler (4-15-19), Jasmine Giles (5-12-17) and Megan Duggan (4-11-15).

Jessie Vetter backbones the defensive unit in goal. She has an 11-0-2 record with a 0.80 GAA, .962 save percentage and five shutouts in 13 games (all starts). In 88 career games, Vetter has a 1.11 GAA, .943 save percentage and 30 shutouts.
